

DNA OF A COMMUNITY GROUP

Our approach to Community Groups is not a man-given method, but one that was given by Christ to the early church. In Acts 2, we see a picture of what Biblical Community looked like for the Early Church:

42 They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching, to the fellowship, to the breaking of bread, and to prayer. 43 Everyone was filled with awe, and many wonders and signs were being performed through the apostles. 44 Now all the believers were together and held all things in common. 45 They sold their possessions and property and distributed the proceeds to all, as any had need. 46 Every day they devoted themselves to meeting together in the temple, and broke bread from house to house. They ate their food with joyful and sincere hearts, 47 praising God and enjoying the favor of all the people. Every day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved.

We see that the Early Church devoted themselves to the Apostle's teaching, to fellowship, to the breaking of bread, and to prayer. This resulted in a group of people who were fully committed to one another and to spreading the Gospel of Jesus Christ to their communities. At The Chapel, we hold to the same values in our Community Groups.

Our Community Groups are devoted to faithful teaching of God's Word, to enjoying good fellowship, and to praying with and for each other. When we are doing these things, like the Early Church, it results in us caring for one another and serving the world.
